- Rural Crime and Street Lighting Director Newell commented he has received calls regarding rural crime and is wanting to look at options to address the issues and concerns. He also noted that street lights have been brought forward as well. Further discussion will take place at a future Rural Agriculture Committee Meeting.
- Cluculz Lake Fire Hall Groundbreaking-June 22, 2021 Director Petersen mentioned he attended the Cluculz Lake Fire Hall Groundbreaking on June 22, 2021 along with staff. Northern Capital Planning Grant funding is being utilized to build the new fire hall.
- Northwest BC Resource Benefits Alliance (RBA) Update Director Brienen noted that the RBA has secured a meeting in July with the Minister of Finance.
- District of Houston Construction Director Brienen announced that construction has begun on Benson Avenue to install a railway crossing arm. They have also started the project to bury hydro lines from Buck Creek to Butler Avenue. Construction on 9th Street has been completed utilizing Northern Capital Planning Grant funding.
- BC Chamber of Commerce -Resolution ICI Director Fisher mentioned that the BC Chamber of Commerce at its Annual General Meeting May 28-29, 2021 passed a resolution regarding Industrial Commercial and Institutional (ICI) recycling.
- Rural Agriculture Committee Update Director Parker spoke of working with the RDBN Agriculture Coordinators and that they are doing a great job.
- COVID-19 Relief Funding Director Parker commented that the COVID-19 Relief funding that is being provided to not-for-profit societies to assist them in mitigating impacts from COVID-19 has been beneficial.
- Director Greenaway noted that organizations in Fort St. James have been very appreciative of funding assistance.
- Francois Lake Ferry Receiving an Industrial Outboard Motor Director Lambert mentioned that the Francois Lake Ferry will have an industrial outboard motor installed.
- Connectivity Meetings Director Riis-Christianson spoke of working to schedule meetings with Members of Parliament and MLA's to discuss Connectivity issues in the region. He mentioned that meetings with the Honourable Lisa Beare, Minister of Citizens' Services took place yesterday with another meeting scheduled for this afternoon.
- Endako Weir Project Director Riis-Christianson has received feedback regarding the Endako Weir Project, and due to COVID-19 engagement has been held virtually to date. Project coordinators have indicated that they will be holding in person public meetings in July.
- UBCM Resolution -RE: BCEHS – BC Ambulance Staffing Director McGuire brought forward submitting a resolution to 2021 UBCM Convention for consideration regarding Emergency Health Services – Adequate Staffing in Communities. The Board endorsed submitting the resolution to UBCM prior to the June 30, 2021 deadline.

Discussion took place regarding a number of issues, including downloading from senior levels of government that are impacting Regional Districts in the northwest.

Director McGuire commented that Chair Thiessen provided a good presentation. Director Riis-Christianson thanked Chair Thiessen for the presentation and spoke of a call he recently received regarding the blocking of a private crossing by a train.

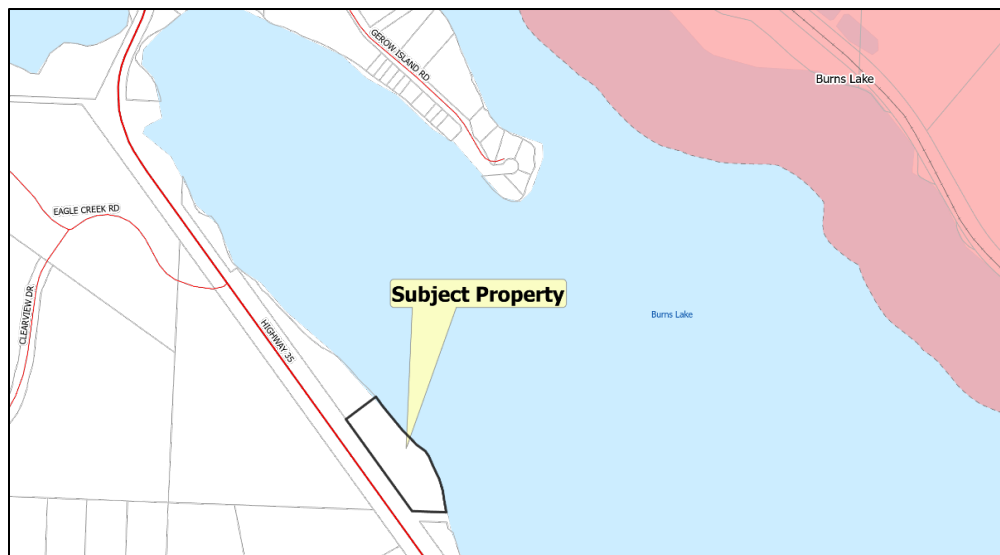

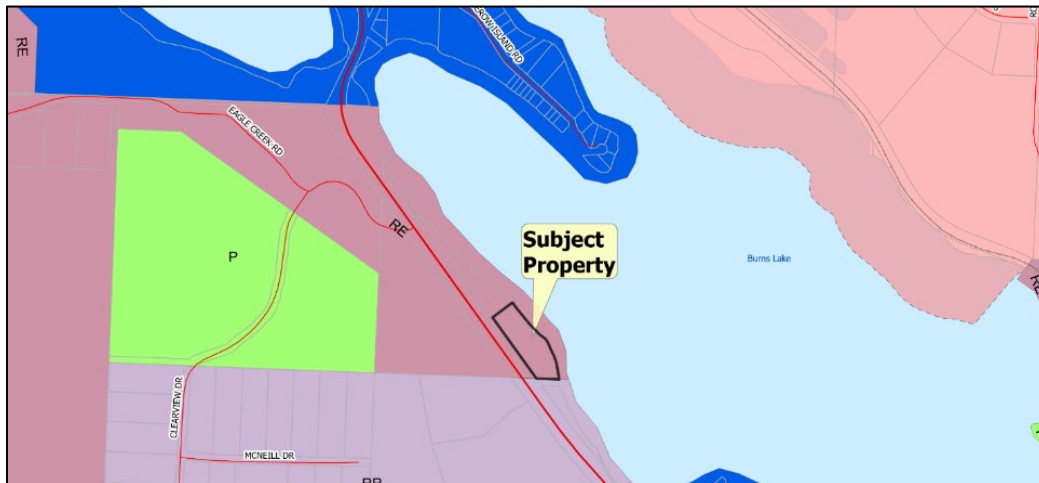

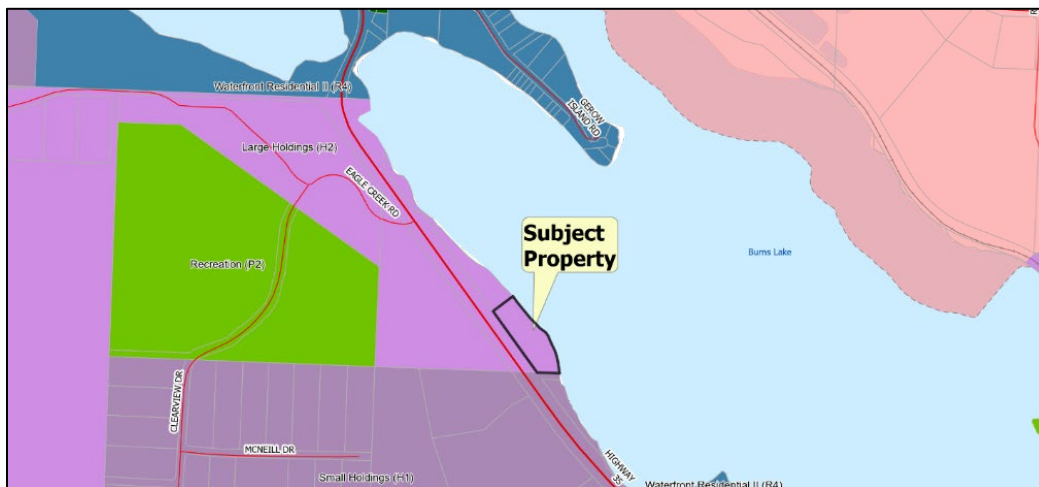
“Applications to permit parcels smaller than 2 hectares (4.94 acres) to a minimum parcel size of 0.8 hectares (2 acres) may be considered where the reduced parcel size will result in an infill subdivision where only one additional parcel is created.”

This will allow the rezoning of the parcel to the R4 Zone.

REFERRAL COMMENTS

The **Ministry of Transportation and Infrastructure** indicated that they have no comment at this time.

The **Northern Health Authority** have not responded at the time of the writing of this report.

Electoral Area B Advisory Planning Commission have not reviewed the proposed development.

PUBLIC HEARING

The Public Hearing for Bylaws 1945 and 1946, 2021 was held on June 16, 2021.

PLANNING DEPARTMENT COMMENT

Rezoning the property from H2 to R4 will not result in increased potential for waterfront development as the existing H2 zone allows two single family dwellings, and the proposed R4 zone allows 2 parcels with one single family dwelling per parcel. Also, the uses in the R4 Zone are more suited to smaller waterfront parcels.

It is noted that the float plane base use is under Federal jurisdiction and is not subject to zoning regulations.

Section 3.5.2(11) of the OCP states:

Applications to permit new waterfront parcels shall not be supported if a lot is serviced by a septic field that is within 100 metres from any lake, unless that septic field is designed by an appropriately qualified engineer or geoscientist to confirm that the proposed septic field will have no detrimental impacts on the adjacent water body. In no case should the setback be less than 30 metres.

The Provincial Approving Officer will ensure, at the time of subdivision, that this requirement is met.

Rezoning Bylaw 1946, 2021 has been approved and signed by the Ministry of Transportation. The Planning Department recommends that OCP Amendment Bylaw No. 1945 and Rezoning Bylaw No. 1946 be adopted.

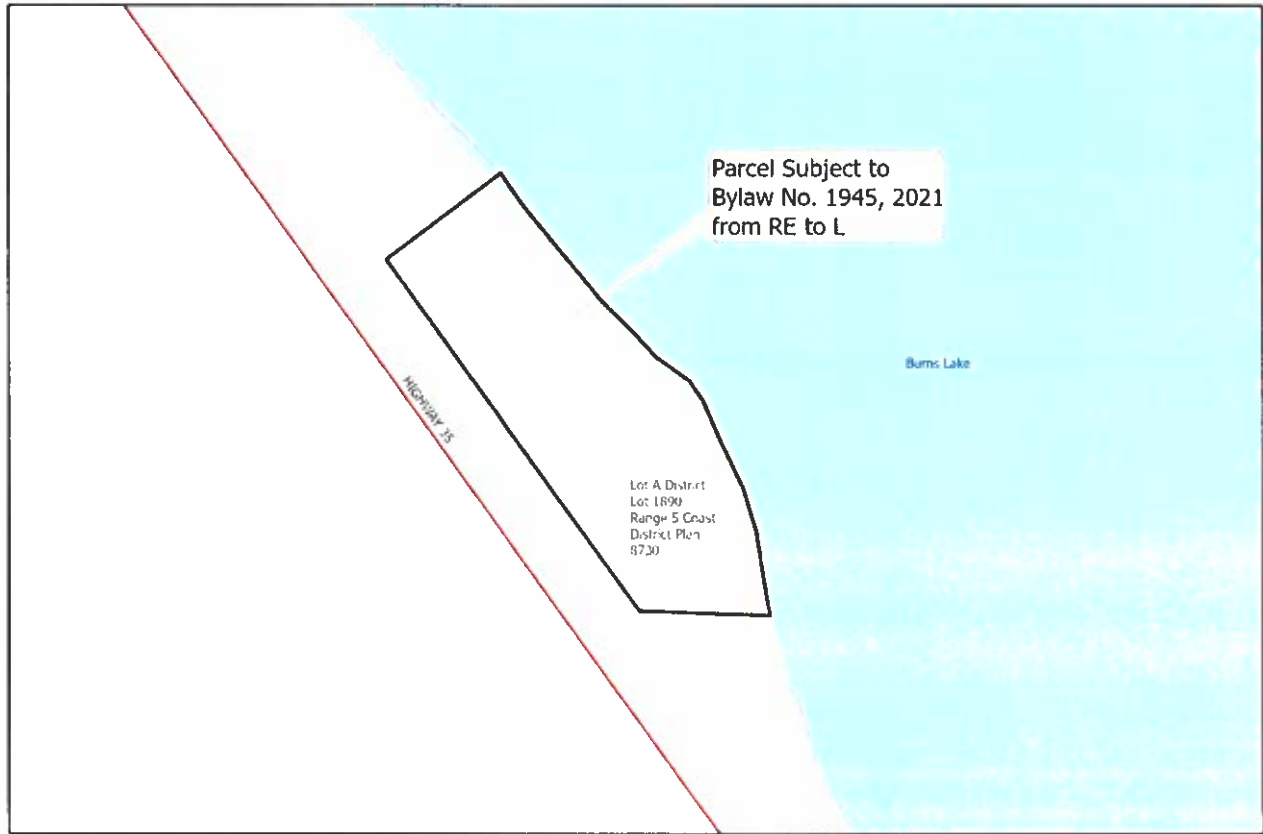

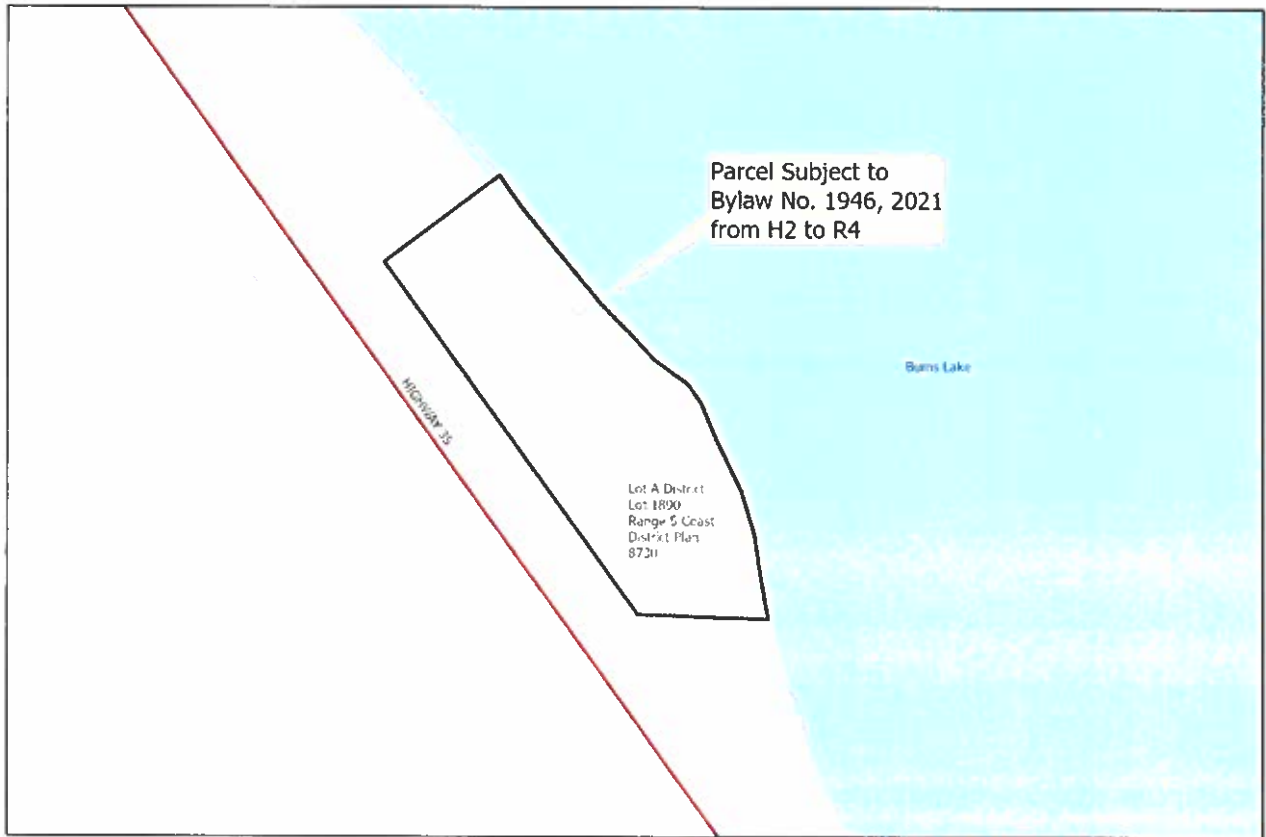

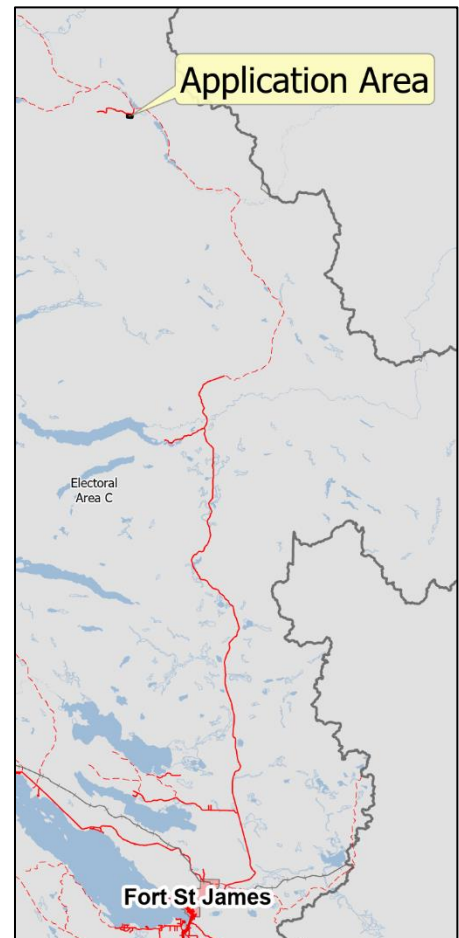
DISCUSSION

This application is regarding a placer lease term extension for 10 additional years.

The application area is found close to the rural community of Manson Creek off of the Thutade FSR and on the Omineca Mining Access Road, approximately 132 km north of the District of Fort St. James.

Placer leases are issued for a term of no more than 10 years and the term may be extended for an additional 10 years. A lease does not authorize any mining activity. However, the permit ensures the exclusive right to all placer minerals on the lease area for that tenure holder.

The surrounding land use is primarily vacant crown land and has historically been explored for mining potential. The community of Manson Creek contains approximately 35 properties and is located 1 kilometre from the application area. It is therefore recommended that the Province consider the necessity for the applicant to undertake a community engagement process to receive feedback from the nearby

RECOMMENDATION

1. That the Board approve Environmental Services 2021 capital budget re-allocation as presented.

BACKGROUND

Since the fall of 2020, the focus of the Environmental Services Department (ES) has been to improve operational continuity, which in-turn improves service continuity for the public and better working conditions for Staff.

Amongst several other actions that have been taken, a re-prioritization of the 2021 Capital Budget is necessary to achieve the continuity goals for the Department.

NEW PRIORITY PROJECTS/PURCHASES FOR 2021

The actual cost of the below purchases will be dependant on the availability of used equipment. Some examples of available units, as of July 6, 2021, are shown below.

1. Mid-sized Excavator (Used):



Expected Cost: \$100,000 to \$200,000:

Continuity: Wood waste relief to increase capacity for field assistants, assist with stockpiling cover soil to comply with new Ministry of Environment regulations and a spare machine during breakdowns/maintenance.

This excavator would be utilized at the Vanderhoof Transfer Station by the East Haul Driver to load wood waste when time permits. The expectation is that the Driver will be able to continuously remove wood waste (2-3 loads per week) from the site and eliminate the need to dedicate a field assistant for 1-2 months per year to clean-out the wood.

The BC Ministry of Environment is expecting to release new regulations in the summer of 2021 which will increase the daily cover requirements from 25% of the active face to 100% of the active face to minimize wind-blown garbage and opportunities for scavenging wildlife.

The excavator would also be available for other projects and would function as a spare machine if the primary excavator is out-of-service.

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2. Roll-off Truck (Used) and Bin:

Expected Cost: \$90,000 to \$150,000:

Continuity: Spare Truck and Assist with Wood Waste:

The Roll-off Hauling program started in 2020 and has become integral to the Western Waste Haul operations and having a spare truck will ensure the continuity of service in the instance of breakdowns. In July 2021, Roll-off will also begin Wood waste hauling from Ft. St. James and Area 'D' Transfer stations which will eliminate the need to dedicate a field assistant for 4-6 weeks per year to clean out the Wood. There is also the expectation that the future Houston Transfer station will utilize Roll-off Bins as well as Southside, Granisle and Area'D' Transfer Stations when the existing Transtor Bin Systems need Replacing (all within 5 years).

BUDGET AMENDMENT

In order to fund higher priority purchases or projects, the ES department has cancelled several projects and included actual or expected surpluses from various projects from the 2021 Capital Plan, see attached table. The cancelled projects will be part of the 2022 capital plan and budget. In total, the ES department is able to re-prioritize a total of \$245,000 for the above purchases with a potential for an additional \$50,000 from an excavator track overhaul that can likely wait until 2022.





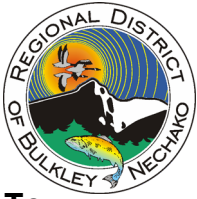

Discussion:

The Regional District owns 894 Class A Voting Shares of Chinook Comfor Limited the general partner in the Chinook Comfor Limited Partnership. As part of the Shareholder agreement the Regional District is entitled to appoint two directors to the company.

The next AGM is on July 20, 2021. To have representation at the AGM, the Regional District is required to appoint a proxy. As the Chinook Community Forest is in Electoral Areas B and E, it is recommended that the Electoral Area Directors for area B and E be appointed as proxies. Chinook Comfor Limited Partnership is a holding company meant to limit liability to the Regional District that has little influence of the “on the ground activities” of the community forest. It is recommended that staff be appointed as a proxy for this organization.

By policy, Miles Fuller and Cindy Shelford were appointed by the board for a two-year term as directors of Chinook Comfor Limited. However, Chinook Comfor Limited requires that the Board appoint directors yearly. Before the next AGM, staff will advertise for individuals from Electoral Areas B and E to express their interest in becoming a director on the Chinook Comfor Limited board to represent the Regional District.

The Regional District will advertise for the opportunity for others that may be interested in representing the Regional District on the Board before the next AGM.

Dear Gerry Thiessen:

Thank you for letter dated May 26, 2021 acknowledging the recent announcement of funding to support cellular service along Highway 16, within your boundaries.

The Province recognizes the importance of cellular connectivity along BC highways and in rural and remote communities, especially for public safety. Cell service is essential for immediate access to emergency services when they are needed most. These emergencies on our highways underscore the importance of people being able to connect with first responders quickly, from anywhere in the province.

Since we formed government in 2017, the Province has invested \$180 million towards connectivity infrastructure projects. This includes the \$90 million, one-time grant as part of StrongerBC Economic Recovery Plan. The Economic Recovery Intake established under this grant allocated \$75 million for broadband projects in communities, and for the first time ever \$15 million for cellular expansion projects along highways and connectivity at rest areas. I am pleased to report that through this funding cellular services will be added to 429 highway kilometers and 27 rest areas, including 252 kilometers and three rest areas along Highway 16.

I commend the Regional District of Bulkley Nechako (RDBN) for its early and on-going interest in regional connectivity planning and thank you for bringing to my attention key stretches of highway that connect municipalities and First Nations communities to the Highway 16 corridor. I was interested to learn about your partnership with CityWest as it speaks to the value of local leadership finding solutions to address connectivity challenges, and I look forward to the successes it achieves in your region. Your relationship with my Ministry staff is also important to our continued collaboration and I encourage you remain in touch ensuring they are aware of the status of fibre and power along the highways you mentioned and regarding pending decisions by the Universal Broadband Fund.

We all have a vested interest in improving services in B.C., and solutions begin with a common understanding of the nature of the barriers, and how we can each effect change. I benefitted from your District's insights during regional meetings with local mayors and regional district representatives in early May, which I had the privilege of attending, at the invitation of my colleague Honourable Josie Osborne, Minister of Municipal Affairs and I appreciated hearing your thoughts once again at the June 23 Northern Round Table.
